The Non Pro Classic/Challenge Finals were dominated by the father-son Manion team of Tommy and Kyle. Tommy Manion (he's the dad) of Aubrey, Texas won the Championship riding Holly Is Smooth (Smooth As A Cat, by High Brow Cat X Holly N Zack, a son of Zack T Wood) with a 223 in the 12 horse Finals, filled with 5 & 6 year old horses. He picked up a check for \$5759. Tommy already has lifetime earnings of more than \$1 million!

Kyle Manion, also of Aubrey, marked a 219.5 to clinch the Reserve Championship and check for \$5404, riding A Smooth Criminal (Smooth As A Cat X Carolina Moon by Peptoboonsmal). Tommy waited for his son to show and escorted him out of the arena smiling broadly. Tommy commented, "We feel blessed that the colts are doing so well. Kyle and I really enjoy doing this together. He's my best friend and supporter." Congratulations to both Manion men!

Kristen Galyean, from Claremore, Oklahoma rode the wonderful gelding named Harley (Spots Hot X Cattilion) to a 3rd place berth in the Finals and a check for \$5048.

She moved back to California in 1988, opened a feed store called Chuckwagon Feed & Pet Supply in Marysville, where she has lived ever since. Open Futurity Gelding Stakes Finals Bimat Burns Bright with Smart E Cat

Out of the 10 finalists, Smart E Cat (Smooth As A Cat by High Brow Cat X Smart Little Dualler by The Dualler) blasted out a very smart run with trainer Todd Bimat aboard, marking a 223 to take the Championship of the Open Gelding Stakes Finals and a paycheck of \$13,294. Todd, who is from Orland, CA has already won more than \$2.2 million in the cutting pen. He said, "These cattle kind of softened up on us. The little horse tried hard. He was right on." His owner, Jerry Erwin of Vancouver, WA almost made it into the Amateur finals. Jerry has his mama

entered into the Fort Worth sale, but Todd said, "He might have second thoughts."

Gavin Jordan of Wilton, CA was the Reserve Champion riding A Smokin Tomcat (Tomcat Chex, by High Brow Cat X Peppys Smokin Edition) and picked up a check for \$10,084 for owner Tracy Taylor of Yuba City, CA. He marked a 218 with a super cowy active run.

Tim Smith of Temecula, CA rode Checks for Sure to the 3rd place spot and a \$6,877 check for his owner Kyle Manion, of Aubrey, TX.

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Non Pro Gelding Stakes Hes Too Smooth Is Top Gelding

Hes Too Smooth (Smooth As A Cat by High Brow Cat X Samantha Little Lena by Nu Cash) ridden by Emily Jones of Arbutle, CA became the Champion of the Non Pro Gelding Stakes. This class is limited (obviously) to geldings ridden by non professional riders, and are all 4 year progeny of the Subscribed Stallions. Certainly it narrowed the field, and this group held 5 finalists. Emily Jones marked a 215 as the second-to-last horse in the herd. "Well...I went on what I saw was happening. I was nervous!" she admitted. "Todd Bimat and Tom Diaz put me on

the cows." Shad Platt originally trained Hes Too Smooth, and Emily bought him just a couple of months ago. "He's a good solid horse." She gave credit to her turn back help of Todd Bimat, Tom Diaz, Shad Platt, and Rock Hedlund, but also to "my best friend, Erin Bimat for warming up my horse."

The Reserve Champion of the Non Pro Gelding Stakes is A Smokin Tomcat (sired by Tomcat Chex by High Brow Cat out of Peppys Smokin Edition, daughter of Docs Gun-smoke) ridden by Tracy Taylor, who marked a 213 and a check for \$4981.

NCHA Non Pro Carol Ward Cranks Out a 224



Lil Dulce Lu carried Carol Ward, of Rancho Murrieta, to a winning finish in the NCHA Non Pro with a 224, which was far and away above the rest of the field of 12 other horses. She collected a check for \$1476. Carol was totally breathless after her run and had to take a minute to be able to talk. She said that Lil Dulce Lu is "home bred." Together, they are 6th in the world NCHA standings. Jason Taylor has been riding her in the

Open, and is currently sitting 2nd. She admitted, "I felt a little pressure! She's been so good for me all year. He (Jason) makes it easy for me. He schools her in the open, and she's warmed up and ready."

Debbie Hall, of Paso Robles, CA put in a clean and solid run on Shorta Bossy for a 218.5 and winnings of \$1107. 3rd in this division was Fredric Steck of Santa Ynez riding Hick Chickaroo with a 217, and payout of \$738.

NCHA Open Sleeman Slips Into 1st Place

Josh Sleeman of Yelm, Washington, riding San Peppy Picaso rode into a beautiful 221 scoring on this run in the NCHA Open class for owner Jennifer Whisler, of Tenino, Washington and received a check for \$1469. Out of the 7 participating horses, the flashy paint may be one of the older competitors. He is 13 years old said the proud Jennifer. She raised him,

and of course much later went on to win the Non Pro Paint event in Las Vegas. She said he is "super athletic and cowy" He is by Senior Pablo Picaso and out of Little Peppy Gem.

Cookie Banuelos, of Las Vegas took 2nd place with his run of 220.5 on One Instant, owned by Theresa Gillock, also of Las Vegas. They received a check for \$979.

Bridle-less Cutting for Charity

Eight of the top cutting horse riders in the nation performed in a Bridle-less Cutting and Calcutta, where 50% of the monies earned in the Calcutta were split evenly between 8 local charities, and the other 50% was given to the person who bought the winning horse in the Calcutta. With rock and roll music playing tailored to each horse or charity (ie: the song YMCA for the YMCA of Paso Robles, or "The Land Down Under" for Aussie Dave Costello), the crowd went wild. There was also a division that included teams of East versus West, where the monies earned in that portion was donated to Breast Cancer Research. Some of the horses were still adorned with their colorful Paint Paso Pink decorations, complete with one hot pink bra as a breast collar. The judges of the Bridle-less Cutting were Andy Adams, Chip Cardon, and Jon Mitchell. The Auctioneer was Billy Mello, with bid spotters, Jason Haefner, Jason Taylor, Gavin Jordan, and Jerry Louie.

The charities splitting the Calcutta monies included Hearst Cancer Resource Cen-

ter, Loaves and Fishes, North County Women's Resource Center, Downtown Paso Robles Main Street Association, Paso Robles Lions Club, Boy Scouts of America, Paso Robles Troop 60, Paso Robles Youth Sports Council, and YMCA of Paso Robles.

The East Team was comprised of Captain – Clint Allen on Holly Smooth, Gary Gonsalves on Spooky Smooth, Matt Gaines on Little Pepto Cat, and Phil Hanson on Lily Shea Rey.

The West Team was comprised of Captain Russ Westfall on Smartest Peanut Yet, Bonnie Johnson on Smart Lil Vidalia, Morgan Cromeron High Cat Annie, and Dave Costello on Buddies Hallmark.

The West Team won the team division with a total of 855 versus 841 for the East. Pretty darn close considering. The highest score of the night, and a run that brought the house down was Phil Hanson's 227.5. He was 1/2 point over the other huge and fabulous score of 227 earned by Dave Costello. A good time was had by all!

\$200K Limited Non Pro 2nd Go Olenasduallyfeather Wafts into the Finals

The \$200,000 Limited Non Pro 2nd go began the long Saturday filled with aged events, more go rounds, finals, and the popular Bridleless Cutting and Calcutta. The first herd was pretty cold and only allowed a high of 214, which was claimed by Reg Koerber riding Rockin Ona Rey (Dual Rey X Little Rey Doc by Peppy San Badger). Reg didn't have such great luck in the 1st go, so he didn't quite make the finals, but showed what his horse could do in a really tough herd, and was pretty excited about that. Reg is originally from Canada, and now lives just to the east of Paso Robles. He bought Rockin Ona Rey as a yearling at the Forth Worth Futurity sale. Reg trained the 4 year old sorrel mare himself with some help from Jason Haefner. Reg has been cutting for about 12 – 13 years and is a contractor specializing in government projects. He said that he is really

happy that the owner of Dual Rey has nominated him to the PCCCHA Subscribed Stallion program.

In the second set of cattle, and out of the 16 eligible horses who advanced to the 2nd go round of this division, Olenasduallyfeather (Cats Red Feather, by High Brow Cat X Olenas Dually, by Dual Pep) ridden by Australian-now-Texan, Lisa Hewitt, marked a 217 for the high score in the 2nd go round, and also the highest combined score of 436. She remarked afterward, "She feels really good. I feel more confident now. The cows were testy, but it has taught me how to cut a little bit smarter."

Kimberly Thome has the second highest combined score with a 423 riding Ichin Ta Dual. 8 horses will advance to the finals and needed a total combined score of 419 to do so.

Cutting Stakes \$50K Amateur 1st Go Fenimore and Barbosa Tie It Up

Out of 2 sets of cattle and 22 eligible Amateur cutters who have not earned greater than \$50,000, one leader emerged from each set with identical 219 scores. Remember that the Stakes contain only 4 year horses that are sired by the Subscribed Stallions. The first herd was all Laura Fenimore's, riding Misplaced Cat (WR This Cats Smart X Tangy Starlight, by Gray's Starlight), a chestnut mare. Laura has shown some real style on her already marking a 220 in the 2nd go round of the Non Pro Cutting Stakes. She said of her

work today, "I wanted to go in first and be clean. This mare has her own eye appeal, so I don't have to do much." Ronnie Rice trained her and she already won the Amateur Futurity in Fort Worth, Texas. Grant Setnicka is helping her now. She added, "I have siblings of hers, that will hopefully keep me going."

Filipe Barbosa riding the sorrel mare Calm Cool Smooth (Smooth As A Cat X Fruit Of The Boom, by

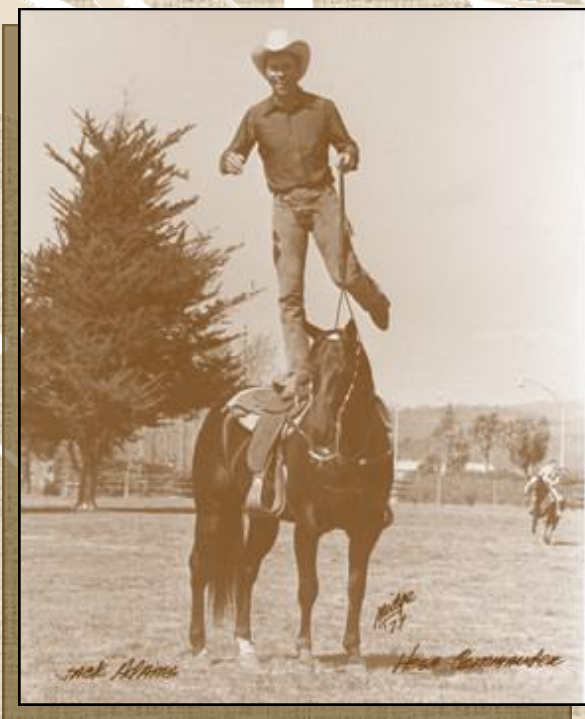

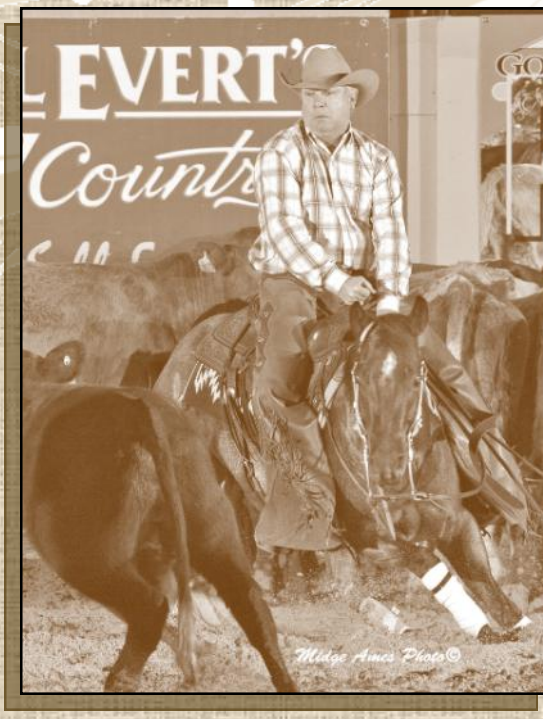

PHIL HANSON - As a second-generation horse trainer, it's no surprise that Phil has established such a solid reputation in the business. His father, Phil Hanson Sr., is also a trainer who began his focus in reining and reined cow horse training until the past 15 years when he began directing his program toward cutters. Horse training may have seemed like an obvious career choice for Phil early on, but upon graduating high school, he chose a different path and pursued a degree in architectural design. Phil graduated from Phoenix Institute of Technology, but his roots called him back to the saddle soon after when he embarked on a training career that has brought him recognition as a top open rider in today's competition.
LTE: \$3,096,388.29



CLINT ALLEN is a native of New Zealand. He had no experience in showing cutting horses, but, as the son of a farrier, he grew up around horses and competed in various disciplines such as reining and western pleasure. It wasn't long after Allen's arrival into the performance horse world that he knew what he would be doing for the rest of his life. He fell in love with the sport and, from day one, committed himself to the industry and his success.
LTE: \$2,916,629.41



MORGAN CROMER - spent her childhood showing English horses, gathering cattle and riding cutting horses. Her first job out of high school was working for cutting horse trainer Russ Westfall. She won two major cutting futurities in 2005, then in 2007 she and fellow trainer Kate Neubert started their own training business in Santa Maria, California. "On Sundays, I'll check my cattle and work my dogs at the same time. [Kate and I] hardly ever go to town or go to a movie. We pretty much just work. I guess when you enjoy what you do, it's not like you have to run away from it and do something else."
LTE: \$585,434.35



GRANT SETNICKA heads the horse training program at Black Rock Ranch, located along 3,000 acres in the Lake Coeur d'Alene river valley in Harrison, Idaho. "My parents really wanted me to go to college," Setnicka said, adding he performed well as a high school student, but "just knew this [training horses] is what I wanted to do." After visiting the multi-million-dollar Black Rock Ranch facility in Idaho, Setnicka said his parents are not nearly as worried about his skipping college as they once were. "That visit helped a lot," the young trainer said. "I think that when they went up there, they were convinced. And they see that I'm happy. I wouldn't have been happy doing anything else."

GARY GONSALVES began his career in California, then made the move to Weatherford, Texas a few years back with his wife, Jessica, and their two children. Having trained cutting horses since the mid-1980s, he believes a trainer's job centers more and more on his or her ability to read and cut the best cattle. "I think it is this way anymore because there are so many good horses and there are so many good horse trainers these days. The way we're breeding horses and getting them trained, it's all coming down to (cattle skills)."
LTE: \$2,704,130.56



MATT GAINES - Six days before his 39th birthday, on Jan. 9 at the Abilene Spectacular Cutting, Matt Gaines became the third person to earn more than \$5 million riding cutting horses. That's not bad for someone who initially attempted to launch a business career, at the urging of his parents, but then discovered he had to follow his heart. "I never would have thought when I started training horses that I would have been able to win this amount of money at this time in my career," said Gaines, a 1992 Tarleton State University graduate.
LTE: \$5,923,547.76



TOM SHELLY trains just about everything! He specializes in training cutting and reining horses but also trains 2 year olds, older ranch horses and the occasional pony. He gives lessons in horsemanship and various equine sports.

LTE: \$328,395.80



HAYDEN UPTON and Shez Cat Actin, the first cutting horse he's ever competed with and a mare that he's trained almost completely on his own, won last year's Classic/Challenge \$200K Limited Non-Pro. A native Australian, Upton, 29, moved to America about 11 years ago. While he grew up around horses and has ridden them often, last year was the first time he's competed as a cutter. He and his wife, Summa, travel to many horse ranches across the country six to nine months out of the year and he taking his horse with him. Texas trainer John Mitchell and California trainer Andrew Coates have advised him, along with others.

LTE: \$42,758.92



LLOYD COX has proven himself to be one of the cutting industry's top horse trainers. Lloyd's top honor came in 2000 when he was inducted into the NCHA Rider Hall of Fame. In 2003, he was the NCHA leading money earner rider of the year earning a total of over \$714,583 in one year. In 2004, he released his first cutting horse instructional video called "Hooking up with Lloyd Cox." Lloyd Cox was not raised with a cutting horse background. In high school, he grew to appreciate the sport and realized he wanted to become a cutting horse trainer. After realizing this desire, Lloyd began setting goals that would help him reach his dreams.

LTE: \$5,138,632.65



TODD BIMATE rode his first cutting horse when he was nine years old which started a fire which has never burned out. Training his first cutting horse when he was 12, he went on to compete in the California High School Rodeo Association. Todd is an NCHA Hall of Fame recipient and has found success in all major cutting events including Champion of the NCHA Super Stakes and the PCCHA Futurity. Todd is a much respected AAAA NCHA judge whose opinion is always valued. Todd has been recognized as great help in the show pen. His help has earned many different riders the success they have achieved. A highlight for him is seeing the face of a first time cutting hopeful and their excitement as they feel the horse move beneath them.

LTE: \$2,210,031.77



TIM SMITH of Temecula, California is one of the highest earning cutters in PCCHA history. He is a two time winner of the PCCHA Futurity Open title – 1989 and 2009, and has finished close several times.

He oversees training, sales, lessons, clinics, and consultations at his business, "Tim Smith Cuttin' Horses."

LTE: \$4,986,456.38



ERIC WISEHART, 25, of Fort Collins, Colorado is a young horse trainer who earned the first \$381 of his cutting career with two checks in 2010. His 4-year-old gelding Hot Shots dominated the \$2,000 Limit Rider finals on at the Western Nationals with a 219 to secure a championship title and \$5,699.

LTE: \$9,928.70



SCOTT WEIS - After graduating from the Cal Poly-Ag Business program, Scott went on to train cutting horses. He started out breaking colts for a living and started competitively showing in 1983. "I just love cutting horses. There is nothing I would rather do than train a good, young prospect and go out and win," says Weis. Besides showing cutting horses, he has contributed to the industry by serving as the PCCHA President in the 1990's and is also currently the PCCHA Vice-President on his way to serve as the President once again. Last year he was inducted into the PCCHA Hall of Fame.

Boomeric), pulled out some good cows toward the end of the second set to match Laura's 219. Filipe was born and raised in Brazil, and even rode cutting horses there too. He now lives in Weatherford, Texas, which someone recently said is the "cutting horse capital of the world." Filipe said that Calm Cool Smooth was trained by Matt Miller, and was bought from Tommy Manion last year. He won the Augusta Futurity, and was in the finals in the futurities at Augusta and Tunica – Mississippi, and the Super Stakes. He spoke very briefly of his work in his exotic Brazilian accent, he said, "It

was very intense and every time is a little hard." Filipe also rode the 2nd place horse, Miss T Ratchet (Cat T Masterson, by High Brow Cat X Missys Ratchet by Docs Hickory) to a strong marking of 216.5.

Within this event, the \$25,000 Amateur Cutting Stakes was also being run. The current leader of that portion is Karen Brody riding Oak III Be Peppy. The Gelding division is led by Angel Pinuelas riding Smart Peptonics (Peptoboonsmal X Smart Little Nike, by Smart Little Lena) with a 216.

8 horses will advance to the Finals to be held on Saturday.

"Our Vineyard is a small family-owned and operated winery that was originally planted in 1989. We originally planted 25 acres of Cabernet Sauvignon on its own root. We then added 25 acres of Merlot and 8 acres of other reds primarily used for blending. Our later plantings are grafted onto a variety of different root stocks. We have had our grapes contracted out to other wineries since the early 90's. In 1994 we started making our

own wine but did not label any for sale until 2002. We started in 2002 with small lots and have been increasing our production since then.

Our red wines are aged in French Oak for 20 months before bottling. We currently produce 2,500 cases per year and will continue until we reach 5,000 cases.

We invite you to come visit us at our winery where we can be found tending to the vines, making wine or mingling in the tasting room. "

Food for Thought



When Ian McPhee left Ian's Restaurant in Cambria and launched this one, it didn't take long for word to get out. McPhee's is worth the short drive south to the historic town of Templeton. The converted old saloon features contemporary country decor, an open kitchen, and indoor and outdoor dining. The menu offers half a dozen appetizers such as an ancho-duck quesadilla or pan-roasted black bass with artichoke pesto, roasted red pepper sauce, and fingerling

potatoes. Gourmet pizza, pasta, an amazing macadamia-crust Alaskan halibut, and four varieties of tender, juicy steaks cooked to perfection round out the Americana-with-a-twist-style menu. Especially impressive are the prices -- it's rare that a restaurant "dedicated to great food and great service" offers the majority of its dishes for under \$20.

McPhee's Grill is a legendary local institution that has won a spate of national awards, including Opentable.com's 2010 Diner's Choice Award.
